In 1971, the Minnesota Wing of the CAF was formed as the first charter unit and acted as a maintenance arm in support of the CAF's expanding fleet of warbirds. In the early 1980s the Wing acquired the B-25J that would eventually become "Miss Mitchell" as a restoration project, conducting the first post restoration flight on the 50th anniversary of the famous Doolittle Raid.




Today the Minnesota Wing continues the CAF's mission started 60 years ago of honoring those who served in WWII by introducing new generations to the sights and sounds of a bygone era.

Wing Officers	Duties and Responsibilities
Executive Officer (XO) Jim Lauria	The Wing Executive Officer (XO) is the Assistant to the Wing Leader. In addition, the XO acts as the Wing Leader in his/her absence.
Adjutant Mark Manske	The Adjutant is responsible for recording and maintaining the minutes of all Unit Staff meetings and sending them and all required Unit records to Headquarters CAF.
Maintenance Officer Jason "Mac" McNeil	The Maintenance Officer's responsibilities include the maintenance and care of all wing assigned aircraft and ground equipment including vehicles. Specific responsibilities are ensuring all wing aircraft are airworthy prior to flight, maintaining appropriate records and training crew chiefs and ground equipment operators.
Operations Officer Keith Struck	The Operations (Ops) Officer oversees the operation of Wing assigned aircraft by ensuring that all flight crew members (Pilots, Flight Mechanics, Loadmasters) are properly qualified and current in his/her sponsored aircraft. The Ops Officer also serves as the Chairman of the Flight Evaluation Board for aircrew assignments.
Finance Officer Linda Franke	The Finance Officer is responsible for collecting all Wing funds. In addition, s/he produces and maintains accurate records to ensure unit compliance with CAF regulations, policies and directives. Also, The Finance Officer ensures that all property donated shall become property of the CAF, Inc.
Safety Officer Andy Schmidt	The Safety Officer has overall and independent responsibility for both ground and flight safety. In addition, the Safety Officer ensures unit compliance with the CAF Safety Management System (SMS).
Public Information Officer	The Public Information Officer's (PIO) responsibilities include proper dissemination of information to the public and Wing members of all Wing events.
Development Officer Amy Lauria	The Development Officer is responsible for overseeing all development activities for the Unit, including creating a Culture of Philanthropy, and oversight of fundraising activities. In addition, the DO provides a recommendation to the Unit Officers of the potential success of any fundraising activity or plan.
Education Officer Robb Keech	The Education Officer will support the national implementation of the CAF Rise Above National Educational/Inspirational Programs drive at the unit level. Also, the EO will support the development of educational programs at the unit local level and its integration into the community

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Welcome!

to the Minnesota Wing of the Commemorative Air Force! As you begin your adventure with the Wing, please take some time to review some safety topics to keep yourself, and others, from harm.

The Wing Safety Officer's primary responsibilities are for industrial, fire and ground movement safety at the Wing. I'm also tasked with monitoring safety systems, enforcing state and local codes, safety directives published by CAF Headquarters and ensuring Member safety.

While you're getting acquainted with the Wing and our Hangar feel free to contact me. I'll be happy to give you a tour and point out where fire extinguishers, emergency exits, first aid kits and various personal protective equipment (ear plug, safety glasses, work gloves, etc.) are located. I can also introduce some of the procedures we use throughout the Wing.

As you become more acquainted with the Wing keep in mind the following:

- Smoking, including using e-cigarettes, is not allowed in our airplanes, facilities or on the ramp (apron).
- Fire Extinguishers of various types are located throughout the hangar for use in fighting different types of fires. If you're unclear which extinguisher is used for what fire, please ask.
- Please clean oil and liquids from the hangar floor to prevent slip hazards. Also, dispose of used rags in the designated container to eliminate potential fire hazards.
- Please keep designated emergency exit paths (red lines on Eastern wall) and exits clear and free of obstructions. If an electrical or air line must be used, properly cover them to prevent a trip hazard.
- Airport Safety: The MN Wing is located on an operating airport. It is important to be vigilant for airplanes and vehicles that are moving or about to move. In addition, avoid standing behind running engines as the prop blast may pick up debris causing injury.
- Use care when working from ladders; make sure the ladder is secure before climbing, don't over-reach or climb above the recommended rung, don't leave tools on the ladder. Finally, observe any placards installed by the manufacturer.

Overall, make sure you understand what you are doing and how to accomplish the job safely before you start work. If you have any questions please ask! We would much rather take a little more time to make sure everything is done correctly and prevent injury or damage. If there is an injury, fire, or damage to facilities of equipment notify the Safety Officer or other Staff member know as quickly as possible. After the fact, or hopefully prior, myself or another Staff Member may suggest a safer way to accomplish your task.

Finally, we are a museum and open to the public. Their safety is of utmost importance. Our patrons include children, seniors and individuals with mobility restrictions who most likely are not aware of most of the hazards that exist. It is every member's duty to provide a safe and inviting environment for them to explore history.

Welcome once again, and stay vigilant!

Frequently Asked Questions

General membership:

What kind of help is needed?

Any and all help is appreciated the Minnesota Wing is a museum, maintenance facility, aircraft operator and finally a business. As you become more involved you will begin to see that there is always work to be accomplished in some form.



When should I show up?

The hangar is open for normal business on Wed and Fri 9:30am-5:00 pm.

The hangar will also be opened for special events and as operational needs dictate.

I don't live near the Wing, can I still help out somehow?

Absolutely! No matter your physical location the Wing can use your assistance. The most visible is coordinating a summer tour stop at a local airport. These stops are central to the CAF's mission of being a flying museum and bring the sights and sounds of WWII to younger generations. Also, during the winter maintenance cycle there are many projects that can be completed outside the Wing, then added to the airplanes to increase their historic authenticity.

How do I sponsor an airplane?

There are three levels of sponsorship which show various levels of additional financial support for an individual aircraft.

Aircraft Sponsor– Required to become a CAF pilot:

\$3500 for BT-13, B-25 and SNJ

\$1500 for L-5, L-17 and PT-22

Restoration Sponsor:

\$1750 for BT-13, B-25 and SNJ

\$750 for L-5, L-17 and PT-22

Supporting Sponsor:

\$350 for BT-13, B-25 and SNJ

\$150 for L-5, L-17 and PT-22



Is there a Wing uniform?

The Official Wing uniform guidance can be found in the members only section of the Wing website. Generally speaking the wing has three uniforms:

Dress:

MN Wing or Aircraft Polo shirt paired with khaki trousers and dark shoes or Mil-spec boots.

Work:

Dark blue CAF work shirt paired with khaki trouser/shorts (weather dependent) and dark shoes or mil-spec boots. Steel toes are preferred.

Flying:

The CAF flying uniform consists of a Mil-Spec Nomex® flight suit with appropriate CAF patches (4) Dark blue (CAF) cotton undershirt, MN Wing or aircraft specific hat and dark shoes or mil-spec boots.

Special Events:

During special Wing events or parades members are encouraged to wear period correct uniforms from the WWII or Korean War era, as appropriate. The more authentic the better, prior to reporting for a special event contact the event coordinator.

When are regular member meetings?

Regular membership meetings are held at 6:30pm on the third Wednesday of the month in the South St Paul Airport (KSGS) Terminal Board Room.

I've got some artifacts at home. Can I donate them?

Of course! The first step is to coordinate with our Museum Officer to see how they might best be incorporated into the museum displays.

Events and Displays:

How do I start participating within the Wing?

The MN Wing truly depends on the active participation of all Wing members. A good way to get started is to sign up for events that are listed on the wing website or through membership email traffic. As you become more familiar with other members and inner workings of the Wing you will begin to find areas where your expertise and interests combine and discover new ways to participate.

How do I know what's happening at the Wing?

As needed, the Public Information Officer will distribute membership wide emails with upcoming events and links to electronic signup sheets. In addition, the Wing homepage and Facebook® page contain a listing of upcoming wing events and participating airshows.

What's the best way for me to get involved?

The best way to get involved is to be at the hangar and ask if there is anything you can do to help out. No task is unimportant, because we are a museum open to the public our facilities

need constant attention. No matter what, all of our members share a common interest in preserving and sharing the history of WWII and aviation with the general public.

Are there any non-flying events?

Absolutely! Throughout the year there are various events both at the museum and around the Twin Cities. Our most popular non-flying events are participating in local parades with our vintage vehicles. If you're interested contact the Motorpool Officer

Maintenance:

Can I work on the airplanes?

An FAA A&P certificate is required to work unsupervised on any CAF airplane regardless of flying status. However, Cadets can assist in maintaining CAF airplanes as long as s/he is under the supervision of an A&P or with the approval of the appropriate Crew Chief.

Can I work on the vehicles?

The Motorpool is always in need of help. For specific projects contact the Motorpool Officer.

Can I drive any of the vehicles?

Yes! Once you turn 16 and obtain your driver's license you will be able to drive any of the vehicles in our Motorpool as long as you have been checked out by our Motorpool Officer or his Designee.

Flight Operations:

How do I get a ride in an airplane?

The most effective way to get a ride in one of the Wing airplanes (without becoming a crew-member) is to be an active participant in wing activities and demonstrate your commitment to the CAF and MN Wing's Mission.

Can I fly CAF Airplanes?

Yes, as long as you have the permission of the PIC and the flight is in a Normal Category Airplane you may manipulate the controls. However, to become a CAF pilot your first steps are; become a CAF Colonel and earn your Private Pilot Certificate.

Are there non-pilot crew positions?

Absolutely! The B-25 requires up to 4 crew members to operate including pilots. For more information contact the Operations Officer.
